We have yours of Sept. 26th in regard to one J. Van Kowski, a former patient of ours, and will say that this patient eloped from the institution July 16,1911, as was so stated to you in our report of August 16.1911. We took special pains to find the man but could not do so. A little later we had word that he was in Seattle, and at once communicated with the Chief of Police there and an attorney, but he seems to have disappeared again, as they were not able to get him. Although when he eloped, his condition was a little better than when he entered the institution, we consider him a fit subject for medical care, and are still keeping up search for him.
