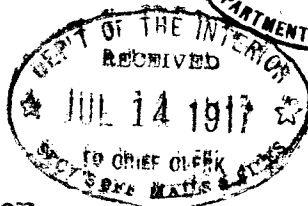
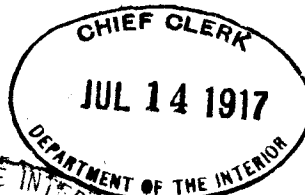

Sir:-

Permit us to acknowledge receipt of the favor of your Department under the hand of Hon. H.A.Meyer, Assistant to the Secretary, dated July 2, enclosing copy of wire from Marshal Tanner of Juneau of date June 20.

The statement of the Marshal that Nick Faricelli was committed to Morningside last July was in error, accounting for the fact that the Department had not found a record of the commitment as-stated.

Faricelli was committed to Morningside on August 7 1916 and will be found in the September quarterly report as patient #608.

" #608. Nick Faricelli. Admitted Aug.7 1916, Juneau. Melancholic. Has a homicidal record. Sullen, vindictive, Indolent, Untidy. Physical condition fair. "

Under the summary of the Dec. 31 report will be found:-

"Patients eloped during the quarter, I.
"Dec. 7 Nick Faricelli, Total I. "

This patient being the only elopement successfully made, as the reports will show, during the past three quarters, ending with the June 30th. report.

Eloperments will occur in any institution for the insane if a due regard is had for the best interests of the patients, and the comfort and curative value of entire or partial parole is employed as at Morningside, where nearly half the patients are accorded the largest possible parole consistent with safety. Our new building, in fact, we call the "Parole Home" upon which neither bolts, bars or restraining screens are any where manifest or employed. Without doubt the humane phase of our non-restraint at Morningside, aids greatly in the large

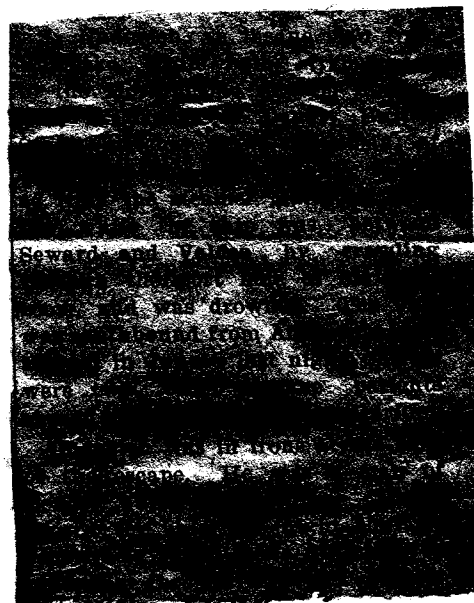
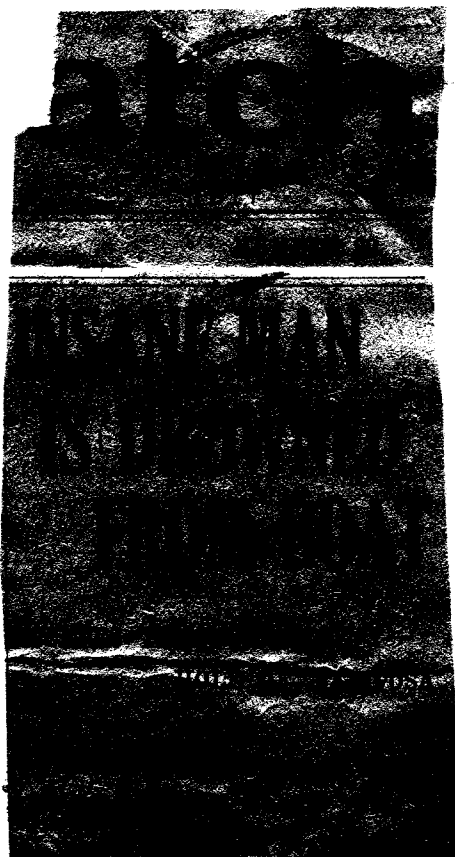

percentage of recoveries at Morningside, the records showing, as on file in the Department, the largest percentage of recoveries of any institution in the United States, the value of the change of climate, of course, being the greatest factor therein. The fact that in over 13 years there has never been a case of suicide at Morningside, although we have had scores of patients and have many now who have attempted suicide while still in Alaska, tells its own story of care at Morningside, including the effects of kindness and confidence in non-restraint there.

In line we attach a clipping just at hand, where a Marshal, three guards and "irons" were eluded, and one Undurich, an insane man while in Alaskan waters got away from his attendants, and drown.

Not only will patients escape from insane asylums, but criminals sometimes get away from places built exclusively for restraint.

The District Attorney at Juneau criticised Morningside in a letter to the Department for permitting the escape of Faricelli. In a reply, which is an appenda to a letter from us regarding another patient, dated Apt. 13 1917, we enclosed a clipping, showing the truthfulness of the almost impossibility of restraining persons at time. The escape referred to in the clipping, it should be stated, occurred before Marshal Tanner took office:— Krause hereinreferred to made human killing a business. His plan was to take persons having a few dollars on their person out in a boat, and for \$25. upward, to kill them. Here was the clipping.

" POSSE PURSUES, MAN

CONVICTED OF MURDER.

Juneau, Alaska, Apr. 18 1917. (I.N.S.) Edward Krause, whose murder of James O. Plunkett stirred all Alaska for its brutality, is being pursued to-day by a posse of 500 men. He escaped last night from the Jail here by sawing his way through the iron bars of the cell window.

Krause was sentenced to be hung next month.

Governor Strong has offered a reward of \$1000 for his capture. Judge Jennings, who sentenced him, and important witnesses in the case are being heavily guarded. "

A resident of Doty's Cove was exonerated for killing Krause at sight.

Faricelli greatly improved at Morningside. He grew good natured and industrious and seemed about well when he eloped. We believe that he was insane when he committed the homicide, but has recovered.

Albertini is now with us. We have not yet decided that he is insane.

In the interest of over 200 non criminals who are insane, we are anxious to see in due course, some arrangement by which Morningside may be relieved of the criminal insane, and have a plan which later we shall bring forward. Morningside is not a prison, and I believe that Marshal Tanner is acting in good faith, seeking stronger quarters for the insane as well as the sane criminal.
